WORLD CONGRESS SCHEDULE

The World Congress will start with an icebreaker on Sunday night, 11 July 2004. Conference sessions will be on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. Wednesday will be an optional field trip day. The World Congress dinner will be on Friday night, 16 July 2004.

The opening sessions on Monday, 12 July will be held in the Social Sciences Lecture Theatre of the University of Western Australia. Sessions on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday will be in the Arts complex. Lunches will be held in the Student Guild.

THE SCIENCE

Contributed paper sessions

The World Congress of Malacology is an opportunity for malacologists from throughout the world to get together to discuss the animals on which we work. Accordingly, contributed papers and posters on all aspects of malacology are welcome. Several major symposia are planned:

Phylogeny of Molluscs

The symposium will be major step forward in our understanding of molluscan phylogeny. Invited contributions will focus on either: (1) on a major taxon and be a state of the art overview of the phylogeny of the group, or (2) examine the state of the art in new areas of molluscan research (genomics, evolution/development). Additional papers dealing with aspects of molluscan phylogeny are welcomed as part of the symposium. Molluscan Aquaculture and Fisheries

Some species of molluscs are important organisms for both wild caught fisheries and for aquaculture. This symposium will bring together researchers working on both wild caught and aquaculture species, both from Australia and overseas, to discuss the latest advances in the field. Ecology of Molluscs

The general theme of the ecology symposium is assessment of threats to molluscan diversity in the changing world. It will include invited speakers addressing issues such as habitat loss and fragmentation, effects of introduced species on indigenous diversity, sea-level rise, urbanization and methods of linking individual and assemblage-level changes in response to environmental change. Medical and Applied Molluscs

The International Society for Medical and Applied Malacology will be meeting as part of the World Congress. Appropriate papers from ISMAM will be incorporated into the symposium on Molluscan Fisheries and Aquaculture. Other papers, largely dealing with medical aspects and molluscs as pests on land, in the sea and in freshwater, will be organised into separate ISMAM sessions. Bivalves

Bivalve systematics has taken substantial steps in recent years, but the "Tree" and resulting classifications are still far from stable. The symposium will take a journey along major putative branches of the Bivalvia, with each contributor introducing diversity and characters of the group, and discussing hypotheses of relationship as well as resulting classifications. Reproduction and developmental patterns in molluscs: an overview

The study of reproduction and developmental patterns in molluscs is now based on thorough studies of reproductive anatomy, physiology and biochemistry of reproduction and intracapsular development, as well as sophisticated studies of the embryonic and larval stages. Results from these studies are widely used both in the applied fields of shellfisheries and parasitology, and in more theoretical areas dealing with evolutionary patterns, phylogeny and biogeography. This symposium will be a broad venue to present results at the forefront of this field, as well as a discussion forum to analyse future directions and methodologies. Biology and systematics of opisthobranch molluscs

Opisthobranchs are a small, but structurally diverse group of marine gastropods. Their fascinating biology attracts considerable scientific interest, and the relationships between many of the major groups are poorly known. This symposium will bring together opisthobranch workers to discuss the latest advances in our knowledge of opisthobranch biology and systematics. Population genetics in the Mollusca

Population genetics has consistently played a significant role in the development of evolutionary biology as well as evolutionarily based taxonomy, also in the Mollusca. Pattern and process in land mollusc diversity.

Twenty years after Alan Solem's global review, many questions remain to be addressed about patterns of land mollusc diversity. This symposium will examine these issues at all scales from different regions of the globe. It will consider technical and analytic issues, and will assess the evidence for the evolutionary, ecological and historical factors that might contribute to diversity levels. Post conference field trip

The Houtman Abrolhos Islands are a series of 122 small low-lying islands located off the west coast of Australia, coast approximately 300 km north of Perth. The environment is dominated by coral reefs, but there are also extensive limestone, sand, and algal habitats. The Abrolhos is situated in a fascinating area where there is a mixture of tropical, temperate and Western Australian endemic species. Nearly 500 species of marine molluscs are known from the islands, and there are no doubt many more to be recorded.

A post conference field trip is planned for the newly opened (May 2003) field station at Rat Island, Easter Group, Abrolhos. The trip will be 5-7 days long, and will include travelling by road to Geraldton, then by boat or air to the Abrolhos. Diving, snorkelling and intertidal reef walking will be undertaken in the islands, some of which have spectacular underwater scenery and large fish. Museum and Fisheries staff will run the camp and boats, and have an intimate knowledge of the Abrolhos. Collecting and export permits will be arranged by the Western Australian Museum. The trip will depart from Perth on Monday, 19 July 2004 and return the following Sunday or Monday.

Koalas, Kangaroos & Sharks

At Caversham Wildlife Park meet Australian favourite wildlife including Kangaroos, Koalas, Wombats, Emus and brightly coloured parrots. Then on to the Aquarium of Western Australia to see marine animals including sharks and seals. Return to Perth via the Sunset Coast and admire the glorious sand and surf of the wide open Indian Ocean beaches.

Rottnest Island Tour

Dive expedition to Rottnest Island

Cost \$ 120. Departs Perth at 8:00 a.m., returns late afternoon. A bus will take you to the Perth Diving Academy in North Fremantle and return you to Trinity College at the end of the day. Two dives will be made at Rottnest Island, about 45 minutes offshore. If the weather is poor, the dives may be made at Carnac Island or another nearshore locality. The trip must have a minimum of 20 people. The cost includes rental of dive equipment, lunch, transport to and from North Fremantle and the boat. Divers MUST have a recognised international scuba diving qualification and an in date medical.

UNITAS TRAVEL GRANTS

Unitas will provide up to 25 travel grants of up to 800 Euros each (400 Euros for Australian residents) to assist participation in the World Congress. Preference will be given to students and others who do not hold permanent positions and have difficulty obtaining funds to attend the Congress. Applicants must be presenting a lecture or poster, and must also be current members of Unitas Malacologica or of Affiliated Organisations. An application form is included in the conferenceregistration papers. It must be completed and returned to the Secretary, Dr Peter Mordan (<u>pbm@nhm.ac.uk</u>) by 29 February 2004.

STUDENT PRIZES

A small number of prizes for the best verbal and poster presentations by students will be available at the Congress. All student registrants will be considered for the pizes unless they specifically indicate on the registration form that they do not wish to be considered.

RESERVES IN THE PERTH AREA AND EXPORT PERMITS FOR SHELLS

Many areas near Perth are incorporated into marine and terrestrial parks and reserves, including areas which will be visited during the Wednesday field trip, such as Rottnest Island. Kings Park, near the University of Western Australia is also a reserve, as are many areas of the Perth shoreline. Please be aware that collecting in reserves is permitted only with a research permit. Aside from the diving trip, no collecting can be done during the Wednesday field trips.

We will be happy to assist people staying after the conference with obtaining the appropriate permits, and on advising where collecting can be done. Exporting of any plant or animal material of Australian species requires an export permit. The Museum can help with exporting such material to your institution for valid scientific purposes at your expense. Please note that we will have to pack the material and export it for you, as we must provide the Commonwealth government with annual listings of species and numbers of individuals exported.

For international visitors, a tax refund may be sought at the airport for goods which they take with them as hand luggage when leaving the country. CANCELLATION POLICY

Authors must indicate in their submission the mode of presentation: either oral or poster. All presentations must be in English. The format is a single A4 page, with 2.5 cm margins and a maximum of 300 words. Font is to be Times New Roman 11 pt, single spaced, and right justified. Titles are to be centred and bold, followed by the author'(s) name(s) and full mailing address(es). The presenter is to be indicated with an * following their name in the title, with an email address. An example is enclosed below. No references should be cited in the abstract.

Centres of Biodiversity and Endemism of Shallow Water Marine Molluscs in the Tropical Indo-West Pacific

The distribution of 1268 species of shallow water marine molluscs in the tropical Indo-West Pacific is examined using published distributional data. Each species is categorised as occurring in one or more of 10 broad geographic regions in the Indo-West Pacific, extending from the Red Sea to Hawaii and the South Pacific Ocean. The greatest diversity (745 species) occurs in the "coral triangle", the region between the Ryukyu Islands, the east coast of Malaysia and Irian Jaya. Diversity in the Coral Sea, including Papua New Guinea, Queensland and the Loyalty Islands is nearly as great (708 species). Intermediate diversity occurs in the western (532 species) and eastern (524 species) Indian Ocean and the western Pacific Ocean (503 species). The lowest diversity occurs in the region between Lord Howe Island and the Kermadec Islands (66 species), Hawaiian Islands (245 species), South Pacific Ocean (293 species), and the Red Sea-Persian Gulf area (336 species).

A total of 321 species, or one-fourth of the total, are endemic to one of the 10 regions. Similar numbers of endemic species occur in the Red Sea-Persian Gulf (51 species), "coral triangle" (49 species), and eastern Indian Ocean (44 species). The fewest endemic species were found between Lord Howe Island and the Kermadec Islands (4 species), and the central Pacific Ocean (14 species).

Conservation implications of the patterns of molluscan biodiversity and endemicity are discussed.

PRESENTATION OF PAPERS AND POSTERS

Unless you are presenting a plenary paper, oral presentations will be 15 minutes plus 5 minutes for questions. Facilities will be available for slides, overheads and digital projection (i.e. PowerPoint). If you are making a PowerPoint presentation, **please** bring a CD of the presentation to the Sunday night icebreaker so we can load the presentation onto a computer to ensure it works. Only computers we supply will be used in the sessions. Please indicate on the abstract submission form if you require any special audio-visual equipment.

A special poster session will be held during the conference and posters will be on display for the duration of the conference. Dimensions should be approximately 1 m x 1.5 m. Velcro or drawing pins will be supplied. The following guidelines are offered for preparation of posters:

- A poster is not a research paper, and should be prepared with the reader in mind;
- Information should be mainly visual;
- Consider the message(s) you want to convey;
- Posters should include the title, author(s) names & organisations;
- Methods should be kept to a minimum;
- Objectives and conclusions must be clear;
- Text should be kept to a minimum and 16 point font should be used; and
- Aim for larger and fewer photographs and illustrations.

UNITAS MALACOLOGICA TRAVEL GRANTS

UNITAS MALACOLOGIA Travel Grants are designed to help enable students of malacology to attend the triennial International Malacological Congresses. The maximum amount of any award will be 800 Euros (400 Euros for residents of Australia)

Applicants *must* be a current member of UNITAS or of an affiliated organisation. **Preference will be given to postgraduate students and malacologists who do not have access to significant alternative funding.** A major aim is to encourage wider representation at congresses of students of malacology from areas such as Asia, Africa, South America and Eastern Europe.

Eligibility will be judged on the basis of *merit* and *need* by the Council of UNITAS. All successful applicants must present either a paper or a poster. It is expected that applicants will provide between one-quarter and one-half of their travel costs from other sources.

In addition to completing the form overleaf, applications must be accompanied by a half-page summary of the proposed presentation or poster, and a supporting letter from a referee, outlining the qualities of the applicant and their work.
